# Top Tips for reading with your child

## A Parents' Guide



- Try to take time every day to read to/with your child.
- Join your local library.
- Pick soothing stories for bedtime reading to help settle your child.
- Use different voices and facial expressions for each character. Don't be shy - your child will love it!
- Keep books where your child can reach them and explore them. Encourage them to read all kinds of things eg comics, signs, even cereal packets.
- Retell stories you have read, even at the dinner table or as you drive the car. Encourage your child to tell you how the story ends.
- Don't forget to do some reading for your own enjoyment. It sets a great example, and lays the ground work for your children to become life-long readers.

### Tips for reading

- Before reading look at the pictures and talk with your child about what they think is going to happen or what the book is about.
- Encourage your child to point to each word.
- Encourage them to use their sounds to blend words that they don't know.
- Help them use the pictures to make a guess.
- Help them to use the keywords they already know when reading.
- Look for words within words  
eg *unforgettable*.
- Break down a word into two parts eg  
cookbook - 'cook' 'book' or 'snow' 'ing'.
- Encourage them to use the rest of the sentence to solve the word they don't know.  
Does it make sense?
- Have they noticed and used the punctuation?
- Is there a pattern or rhyme?
- Can they read with expression eg doing different voices for different characters?

### Comprehension

Ask questions like:

- Where is the title?
- What is the book about?
- What does this picture tell you?
- Stop whilst reading. What do you think will happen next or at the end?
- Who was your favourite character?  
Why?
- Did you like this book? Why?
- Why did that happen?
- Why did ... do that?
- Relate to real life experiences eg have you ever? Do you remember when?
