

There are a number of reasons why it is really important to call or message when your child is absent school.

- Attendance records: We maintain attendance records for each child. Informing us about your child's absence helps in keeping accurate records. Consistent communication can prevent misunderstandings and ensure that the school is aware of the reasons for your child's absence.
- School policies: We have specific policies regarding attendance and communication of absences. Notifying the school about your child's absence helps you comply with these policies and ensures a smooth relationship with the school administration.
- Responsibility and accountability: Teaching your child the importance of responsibility and accountability is a valuable life lesson. When you make the effort to communicate their absence, you demonstrate the significance of taking responsibility for one's commitments.
- Building a partnership with the school: Regular communication with the school helps build positive relationships. It shows that you are actively involved in your child's education and that you respect the school's policies and procedures.
- Emergency/ safeguarding situations: In the event of an emergency or unexpected situation, knowing your child's whereabouts and well-being is crucial. If the school is aware of your child's absence, they can respond appropriately if needed.
- Social and emotional support: If your child is going through a difficult time emotionally, letting the school know about their absence allows for additional support and understanding from teachers and staff.

Overall, phoning your child in sick to school is a responsible and considerate action that benefits not only your child but also the school community as a whole. It contributes to a positive and cooperative relationship between parents and educators, fostering an environment that prioritizes the well-being and education of each child.

Staying safe online



Please be mindful that social media apps are not appropriate for pupils under the age of 13. Below are the age restrictions for the most popular apps:

- What's App—16 years +
- Instagram—13 years +
- Facebook—13 years +
- Snapchat—13 years +
- TikTok 13 Years+



What are the risk of children using social media apps?

- Many sites include an instant message function that allows private conversations between site members.
- Most social networking sites have an app version available, meaning your child will have access to the social network from their smartphone or tablet. Some app versions of social networks use the location of the phone.
- Information shared between friends can be easily copied and may spread.
- It isn't easy to take back information that has been posted and can be impossible if it's already been shared.
- Not everyone your child meets online will be who they say they are. Chatrooms and forums can connect people who are complete strangers and can be unmoderated.





As a federation some of our staff have been learning about stormbreak and the impact that it can have on children. Throughout the year, our aim is to begin implementing Stormbreaks into our curriculum.

A stormbreak is purposeful participation in movement to shape and support mental health. Stormbreaks are focused on concepts supporting good mental health including resilience, self-worth, relationships, self-care and hope and optimism. Through regular Stormbreaks, children learn skills to positively shape and support their mental health for life.


So far, a selection of classes across the federation have trialled Stormbreaks and have thoroughly enjoyed them.



Alongside Stormbreak, some staff are completing Dragonfly training which is Senior Mental Health Lead Training. There are 5 core units in the training which support staff in creating and developing our whole school approach to mental health. These units cover areas such as: ethos and the environment, staff development and targeted support.

Throughout the year, the Senior Mental Health Leads will disseminate the training to all staff and monitor the impact of our mental health interventions, which include tutoring and mentoring.

Identifying those with SEN

A child or young person has special educational needs if they have a learning difficulty or disability which calls for special educational provision to be made for him or her. (SEND Code of Practice)

SENDIAS are an advice and support service. They offer up to date, accurate and impartial resources and information.



Graduated Approach:

Many children across the Federation take part in a variety of interventions to meet their individual needs.

Wave 1: Inclusive, high quality teaching for all.

Wave 2: Additional interventions to enable children to work at age related expectations

Wave 3: Additional highly personalised interventions.

For some children this will be a small catch up group, others may receive 1:1 emotional support, and some may receive a more intensive programme of support.

We follow the assess, plan, do, review cycle to ensure a personcentred approach , maximising each child's potential. Teachers meet regularly to plan provision for children.

The raffle raised an amazing £1267.30 across the federation .



Pre-School





The children have enjoyed our Room on the Broom topic. Our focus area of learning has been PSED (Personal Social & Emotional Development) and we have had a lot of discussions about the feelings of the characters in the story. We have also been talking about our basic emotions and linking these to real life scenarios. The children have learnt the story well and they have been using soft toys, story stones & puppets to recall events and phrases.

We visited the Junior School garden to collect the pumpkins that we planted in in the summer term. We have been exploring pumpkins and the seeds inside, talking about how they look and feel. The children have been using their fine and gross motor skills for finding different ways to draw pumpkins and adding lines and dots to their creations. 



This week, we were busy preparing our Enterprise orders. We focused on creating fun, festive wrapping paper and took great care in painting beautiful tea light holders. In Maths we explored 3D shapes and used modelling materials as well as nets to make a variety of shapes.

- In the New Year, we will be focusing on telling the time. Here is some key vocabulary that would be useful for them to recap over the holidays: hour, minute, seconds, morning, noon, afternoon, evening, midnight, am and pm. Talk about how many seconds in a minute and how many minutes in an hour.

Our next topic will be called Extreme Earth. This will have a focus on physical features of the Earth including Volcanoes and Earthquakes.

We will also be comparing and grouping different kinds of rocks as part of our Science.


Class Cup Class 3– William Class 4 - Corren Star of the Week: Class 3–Scarlett Class 4 -Elijah
